Name	Description	
		Also called "Upright" Planks or poles with no width (spread)
		A wide, flat jump
		Also called "Chevron"

Reproduction rights obtainable from wew CartoonStock.com	A vertical jump.
	Two or more verticals placed, & jumped, together. Also called a "spread" The closest pole the lowest. Standards not connected.
	Three rails all attached to the same standard.
	Triangular, widest at bottom. Very common on cross country courses.
	Also called a "tiger trap".
	Only ½ of a triangle Also called "Ramp"
	Rails on one side are spread out with standards to look like a fan when viewed from above.

	Any jump where your mount will touch the water, either before or after jumping, or both.
	Any jump where your mount will jump up or down to another plane.
	Rail (log) over a ditch
	mount will jump up or down to another plane.

Distance between the standards is reduced
Two or more obstacles to be jumped as one; usually labeled A and B.
A combination of two or more sets of jumps where the sides are closed in and the only way out is by jumping. Not allowed for D rates.
